But most of them settle down in the urban areas and hence the dentist population ratio in India's urban areas is about 1:10,000 while it is 1:1,50,000 in the rural areas. While conferences such as these will enthuse more youngsters to pursue dentistry as an occupation it is necessary to underline the point

that there needs to be greater spread of doctors to the rural areas.

Several important branches of Dentistry such as Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, Prosthodontics, Conservative Dentistry and Endodontics, Periodontics, Pedodontics, Aesthetic Dentistry, Oral Medicine and Radiology, Dental Photography are proposed to be covered at great length during the technical sessions of the conference.

International and National speakers who have been pioneers in the field of Dentistry will be elaborating on these subjects.

High levels of prevalence of

a) Dental Caries

b) Periodontal Disease

and

c) Malocclusion

are important areas of concern which need to be addressed in India.

There also needs to be emphasis on Dental Awareness programs. Maintenance of standardized patient data and creation of Dental Software that are uniformly put to use all over the country. These are simple steps that could help in better care and follow up vis-a-vis patients afflicted with dental problems.
